WHS Searider Productions' New Complex Now Open

Several positive things happened during the pandemic. One of them was the completion of the Searider Production (SP) complex located on the Wai'anae High School campus.

The project broke ground in June of 2018 following a blessing of the space on June 6, 2018, by Waianae Coast Comprehensive Healing Center staff members Kaliko Chang, Makani Tabura, Kamaki Kanahele and Uncle Kepa. Searider Production classes, which were working out of two separate buildings were relocated to various classrooms throughout the WHS campus. The scope of this project was to create

a connection between the buildings to enhance student safety and provide additional usable space for future growth as SP had "outgrown" their two current spaces.

Construction "ramped up" and everything was moving on schedule, and then the pandemic hit. SP staff had to work with students "remotely" in the various classrooms and several jobs were considered "non-essential" both on campus and with construction. Fortunately, things continued to move forward, just a bit slower than anticipated.

Construction was completed earlier this year and then came the daunting task of trying to get equipment, furniture and "finishing work" done during the pandemic, which was no easy task. Undaunted, SP Foundation Director Candy Suiso and her team continued to push to get things done. Finally, things

have been completed and the staff was able to get things up and running. One of the great things is that they were able to "beta test" several programs during the pandemic to make sure everything

was ready to go when they welcomed students back to campus.

The 8,500-square foot facility includes a "makery space" — an area Continued on page 11

WCCHC Updates on Services, Programs and Returning to "Normal" Submitted by Rich Bettini

While the COVID-19 virus still lingers and continues to pose a threat to our community, we are moving a little closer to normal. As we vaccinate more of our community members, we are able to offer more services directly.

We are excited to have re-opened our Farmers' (Mākeke) Markets every Saturday at the Wai'anae Mall and on Tuesdays at the Health Center's Main Campus and we're still providing Keiki and Kupuna Pantries this summer. (See pages 2 & 8)

Since the onset of the pandemic in March 2020, the Health Center has distributed 3,872,226 pounds of food and over 347,702 keiki/kupuna meals through our drive-thru distributions and keiki/kupuna pantries. Although our last monthly drive-thru food distribution was June 26, we will continue to support our community through weekday keiki/kupuna meals and food pantry distributions, our Mākeke farmers' market's SNAP Doubling program and Waianae Comp's three produce pre-

We have finally moved into Tier 4 as our case counts continue to drop as more of us get our vaccines. As of July 8, the state is projected to reach the goal of 60% fully vaccinated. This now means fully vaccinated U.S. travelers flying domestically, including island residents returning home, will be allowed to bypass Hawai'i's quarantine and pre-travel restrictions, if they upload their vaccination records to the state's "Safe Travels" website and arrive with a hard copy of their vaccination records. In addition, the number of people allowed to attend social gatherings will increase to 25 indoors, outdoor gatherings will increase to 75 people and restaurants will be allowed to increase their seating capacities to 75% of their maximum allowed

capacity. All current gathering limits are expected to be lifted in a couple of months, once the state of Hawai'i sees a 70% fully vaccinated rate statewide. So — get vaccinated so we can continue to move forward and get back to normal!


As the effects of Covid-19 begin to subside and keiki return to school, WC-CHC has held their last community food drive-thru distribution on June 26 and will start to transition their programs to a more pre-pandemic operation. The Mākeke Farmer's Market will go back to being open every Saturday at Wai'anae Mall as well as their Mākeke 'Iki every Tuesday at WCCHC's main campus. They will continue to serve the community through their weekday keiki & kupuna pantries, EBT Double Bucks program, and the WCCHC's produce prescription programs. Now for this month's question, "Is Kaiser Nānāikeola clinic ever going to









West O'ahu Electricity Use

West O'ahu's energy needs in 2020 were impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, with both the Kapolei/Makakilo and Wai'anae districts recording higher residential electricity use but lower commercial use.


The breakdown of residential and commercial customers varies by district. In Wai'anae, residential consumption accounted for 57% of usage; Kapolei and Makakilo reported 28% – slightly higher in both districts as compared to 2019 data.





Hawaiian Electric's Campbell Industrial Park (CIP) Generating Station is a 130-megawatt fuel-flexible power plant that includes a 128-kilowatt photovoltaic solar system to power plant operations using the sun.




Before the CIP Generating Station was developed,
Hawaiian Electric and West O'ahu community leaders agreed to a
Community Benefits Program for the Leeward Coast community
adjacent to the plant. This update and the community programs
described are a result of that commitment.

Monitoring Our Impact

At Hawaiian Electric we strive to protect the environment and ensure the safety and health of the public. To minimize the impact in communities where we operate, we continue to:

- Monitor air quality at the Lualualei and Pālehua stations.
 Near real-time data is available on <u>www.westoahuair.com</u>.
 Due to the pandemic, the Wai'anae station relocation was delayed and operations are expected to resume in 2021.
- Minimize potable water use for electricity generation at our Kahe Power Plant and CIP Generating Station with reverse osmosis water from Honouliuli Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- Make night skies friendlier for endangered seabirds with International Dark Sky Association-approved lighting at Kahe Power Plant and CIP Generating Station.
- Study and monitor fish communities and populations along O'ahu's Leeward Coast. Annual surveys can be found at hawaiianelectric.com/westoahu.







Empowering Hawai'i to Thrive Together



A lot has changed since our last West O'ahu Report – but Hawaiian Electric's commitment to our customers remains steadfast. The pandemic may have altered the way we connect with our communities (virtual rather than in-person gatherings), but we haven't stopped building those connections.

Together we're working to improve our island grid, strengthen our economy, and make our towns and neighborhoods more resilient. Hawaiian Electric knows that partnering with communities is essential to building a stronger Hawai'i that is moving steadily toward energy independence, responsibly using our natural resources to make electricity and reduce the use of fossil fuels.

Our energy landscape is changing: The AES coal plant in Campbell Industrial Park will be retired next year; the Kapolei Energy Storage project is expected to come online in 2022; solar-plus-battery storage projects are being developed; and the company's shared solar program is expected to launch this year, allowing customers who aren't able to install rooftop solar to participate in the solar movement.

Hawaiian Electric remains fully committed to decarbonizing our energy system and looks forward to even broader participation by stakeholders and communities in shaping Hawai'i's energy future.

Supporting Our Communities

During a year of uncertainty, caring for our communities was our highest priority as we sought ways to help individuals and families manage through the impacts of the pandemic. From donating funds and holding base rates flat in 2020 to voluntarily suspending disconnections for nonpayment, Hawaiian Electric and our employees focused on the needs of our customers and communities. Some highlights:

- On O'ahu, more than \$1.1 million was donated by our company and employees for charitable and COVID-related relief, including employee-led fundraising for Aloha United Way and Hawai'i Foodbank.
- Seed funded \$2 million for the Hawai'i Utility Bill Assistance Program to help local residents behind on their bills pay water, sewer, gas and electric utility bills. More than 2,700 Hawai'i households received assistance. Hawaiian Electric employees also donated another \$37,180 to supplement the program. With matching funds from the HEI Charitable Foundation, a total of \$56,810 was contributed to the fund.
- While the pandemic eliminated opportunities for in-person volunteering, Hawaiian Electric employees found creative ways to give back, from making sandwiches for the homeless/hungry to designing uplifting greeting cards for homebound seniors.
- We met with West O'ahu community leaders and neighborhood boards before the pandemic to introduce two proposed battery energy storage projects at Kahe and near our Campbell Industrial Park Generating Station, and held a virtual community meeting online in April. While the projects were not selected by Hawaiian Electric's RFP team, we received valuable feedback from community members and the public.
- The moratorium on disconnections for nonpayment expired in May, but Hawaiian Electric wants customers to stay connected. We continue to offer a range of payment options and encourage customers experiencing financial hardship to contact us so we can help. Legislatively Speaking



Senator Maile **Shimabukuro** Senate District 21 Wai'anae Coast Ko Olina Honokai Hale Kalaeloa

Aloha! I am pleased to report that I successfully sponsored SCR25, which the Legislature adopted. The resolution requests that the Department of Public Safety (PSD) allows Faith Pods based on Kapu Aloha to be established within each Correctional Center.

'Ohana Ho'opakele testified that "Faith Pods have been initiated in North America where our Hawaiian pa'ahao (prisoners) have experienced as safe spaces to learn about their Hawaiian identify. Mr. Kaleihau Kamauu first started the Makahiki program in November 2003 while in Diamondback Correctional Facility in Watonga, OK. He is now the Vice-President of 'Ohana Ho'opakele which meets weekly on Saturdays to promote Pu'uhonua as an alternative to prison."

Lilinoe Kauahikaua testified that "In 2010, Native Hawaiians made up only 10% of the population. Yet they made up 39% of those incarcerated in the State. Since 1977, the amount of people

incarcerated in Hawai'i has increased by more than 700%. This disproportionate rate of incarceration among Native Hawaiians has had devastating impacts on Native families, leading to increased poverty, at risk youth, and family separation."

Finally, PSD testified that they "agree with the value of this suggestion and have already begun the review process to determine if PSD may be allowed to establish faith pods in our facilities, Continued on page 14


After community advocacy and our efforts to push House Resolution 149, the Department of Transportation (DOT) has announced changes to their plan to replace the Mākaha Bridges. The DOT will no longer build a bypass road on Mākaha Beach and will use a prefabricated steel bridge to lower costs and construction time. The DOT has said that they will try to apply for federal grants to realign the highway, and this repair of the 84-yearold bridge will not prevent future realignment. DOT did a community presentation in June (which also discussed lane closures and the Maipalaoa Bridge delays) Continued on page 14

Approximately 85,000 veterans currently live on O'ahu, with about 118,000 in the state. This will be a 120-bed facility and will offer skilled nursing and intermediate care facility beds to provide long-term care services plus geriatric, mental health/dementia/Alzheimer's care, rehabilitation therapies, hospice, respite and adult day care.

This facility will target both longterm and short-term veterans populations, eligible spouses and Gold Star parents and will be open to all veterans living in Hawai'i.




Their first classes were held this summer with students volunteering their time not only learn new skills, but to become part of the new programs now being offered with the expanded space.

mium raw Hawaiian honey, hidden in Wai'anae's backyard.

The Tolentino 'ohana has been farming since 1982 in Lualualei Valley. After discovering a decrease in crop yield, they also noticed a lack of pollinators. Out of desperation, they started hand pollinating their vegetable blossoms in 2007. With a lot of concern and research, they discovered the University of Hawai'i's "Honeybee Project" and in October 2008 the family adopted their first hive.

Since then, honeybees have made a dramatic comeback on the Wai'anae Coast and the Tolentino's have been blessed with a passion for beekeeping. Their honeybees forage on

wild kiawe, fruit trees, tropical blossoms, and seasonal crops, producing an amazing premium honey.

What started as a mission to increase crop yield has since grown to include a new business, the Tolentino Honey Co founded in 2017. The next generation of Tolentino's will take over responsibility for running the company in the future

Though my bill to facilitate the return of Mākua Valley did not receive a hearing, I am happy to have helped in passing HB1352, which requires the state to: 1) Inventory lands leased to or controlled by the federal government; 2) Identify known contaminants or environmental hazards on the land; and 3) Propose alternative uses for the lands. This year the legislature secured \$50 million for infrastructure for new homesteads, \$10 million for repairs to existing homesteads, and \$1 million for plans and land acquisition for new DHHL homesteads. It is my hope that places like Lualualei can once again return to agricultural Hawaiian Homesteads or that Mākua Valley will be preserved and restored for preservation and appropriate cultural use.
